



## Herbert "Herb" B. Baron

October 27, 1924 - April 25, 2023

Herbert "Herb" B. Baron passed away peacefully of natural causes on Tuesday, April 25, 2023, in Jacksonville, FL. He was preceded in death by the love of his life, Lorraine (Fertick) Baron. He is survived by his children Bruce Baron (Billie) of Westfield, NJ and Audrey Goodpasture (Richard) of Jacksonville, FL and his grandchildren Carl Baron (Danielle), Ben Montalbaron (Michael) and Rachel Baron of New York, NY, Chloe Baron of Westfield, NJ and Jacob Woods (Lauren) of Atlanta, GA.

Herb was born on October 27, 1924, to Israel and Rose (Ostrow) Baron. He grew up in North Philadelphia and attended Central High School. He enlisted in the U. S. Army at age 17 during his senior year in high school. He left for WW II immediately after basic training and served with the 36th division in both the North African and Italian campaigns. He then was stationed in the Philippines awaiting the planned invasion of Japan when fortunately, the war ended.

Post-war, Herb graduated from Temple University with a B.S. in Marketing and Business Administration, and then earned an M.S. in Economics at the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School. Following school he met the love of his life, Lorraine, and began a 60-year love affair which Herb chronicled in his memoir "La Dolce Vita, A Love Affair Until the End of Time" (Friesen Press, 2012). The book tells the inspiring story of Herb's life journey. It tells how his

life was shaped by his coming of age in the Great Depression and surviving the ravages of war shaped every aspect of the rest of his life.

As newlyweds, Herb and Lorraine lived near Newark, NJ where Bruce and Audrey were born. Over the years, his entrepreneurial adventures led him to live in Long Island, Chicago, Beltsville, Maryland before eventually returning to the Philadelphia area until he retired to Sarasota in 1995. His businesses took him to many countries around the world including South America, South Africa, and he was involved in some of the earliest business dealings with China. Herb had a knack for recognizing innovation and business opportunities. His companies were some of the first to market such culturally recognizable items as the waterbed, the foldable futon bed, bean bag chairs, and the hula hoop.

Herb thrived during his retirement in Sarasota. He was always on the move even in retirement and played tennis well into his eighties. He and Lorraine got the opportunity to travel during this time. He cherished visits with family and friends and loved to socialize.

Herb was a WW II veteran, entrepreneur, import-exporter, marketeer, and world traveler. But most of all Herb was a family man. He was always at family events including birthdays, bar/bat mitzvahs, Passover, Thanksgivings, and any other time that he was needed. He was happiest when he was sharing his love with his family.

A graveside service will be held at 9:30am on Thursday May 4, 2023 at Sarasota National Cemetery, 9810 State Road 72, Sarasota, FL 34241.
