Huntley Ainsworth Maxam, 72 of Sarasota, Florida passed away unexpectedly on May 10, 2020.

Huntley was born in St. Elizabeth Parish, Jamaica West Indies on October 15, 1947 to Sylvan and Ethel (Lyn) Moxam. He spent his early years in Montclair, NJ where he attended Hillside Elementary and Middle School. After graduating from Montclair High School, he attended Columbia Union College in Tacoma Park Maryland and Oakwood College in Huntsville, Alabama.
