Theodore (Ted) F. Ruckert was born May 9, 1934 in Teaneck, New Jersey and died February 14, 2022 in Venice, Florida. He was a devoted family man who loved and cared deeply for his family. He grew up in New Jersey and Pennsylvania and after attending Penn State, he joined the Army and was proud to serve in the 101st Airborne Division.

Ted met and married Nancy Dowdy, while attending Jacksonville University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in History/Government. After graduation, they moved to San Francisco, California where they enjoyed the newlywed lifestyle.

Eventually, Ted and Nancy moved back to Florida and where Ted became the proud father of a son and daughter. They moved to Venice, Florida in 1973, where Ted was a Trust Officer for the First National Bank of Venice. Living in Venice, Ted felt completely at home on the gulf coast, made many good friends and played an important role in establishing Youth Soccer in Sarasota County.

Ted traveled throughout North America, Central America, and Europe where he enjoyed white water rafting, hang gliding, hot air ballooning and riding an alpine slide with his granddaughters before relaxing at the end of the day with a mug of beer or glass of red wine.

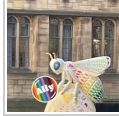

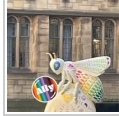
